BAHA LIKES "ALL RIGHT."

Persian Prophet Thinks It Is Our Most Characteristic Expression.

MONTCLAIR, N. J., May 12.—"All right" is regarded by Abdul Baha, the Persian prophet of worldwide peace and human brotherhood, as the most characteristic expression of the people of this country.

"Wherever you go you hear it," he said to-day at the home of Charles H. Edsall, where he was entertained after he had spoken to a large audience in Unity Church. "You ask the bell boy at the hotel to do something and he responds, 'All right'; you inquire as to the health of a friend and he answers, 'All right'; everything is 'all right.' I have never heard the expression used in any other country, and I believe that it reflects the optimism of this great country."

Abdul Baha came to Montclair to-day accompanied by a retinue of beturbaned retainers and interpreters, and the presence of the prophet and his entourage in Unity Church gave a picturesque aspect to the Sunday morning service. A number of Bahaists from New York were in the congregation that heard the master of their cult speak. Montclair has about fifty Bahaists, and all were present.
